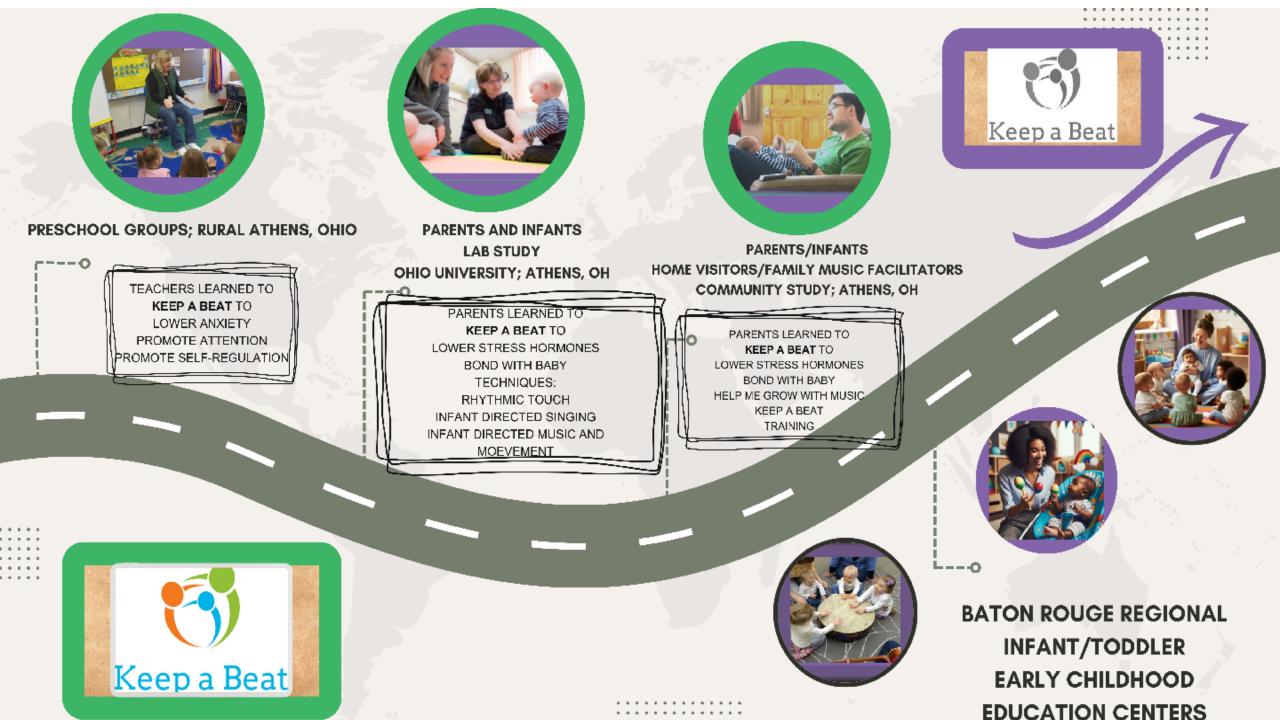

Music is Healthy

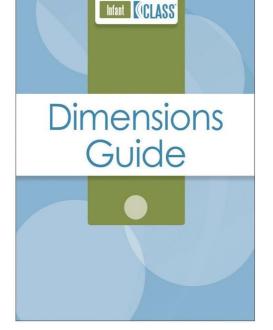

Music Environmental Assessment (MEA - I)

Example from Dimensions: "Teacher uses close proximity when interacting with baby." <u>MEA-I:</u> "Teacher uses live music such as singing or humming when in close proximity and when interacting with baby."

Observe music strategies already in place related to teacher-

infant interactions and music-based experiences.
