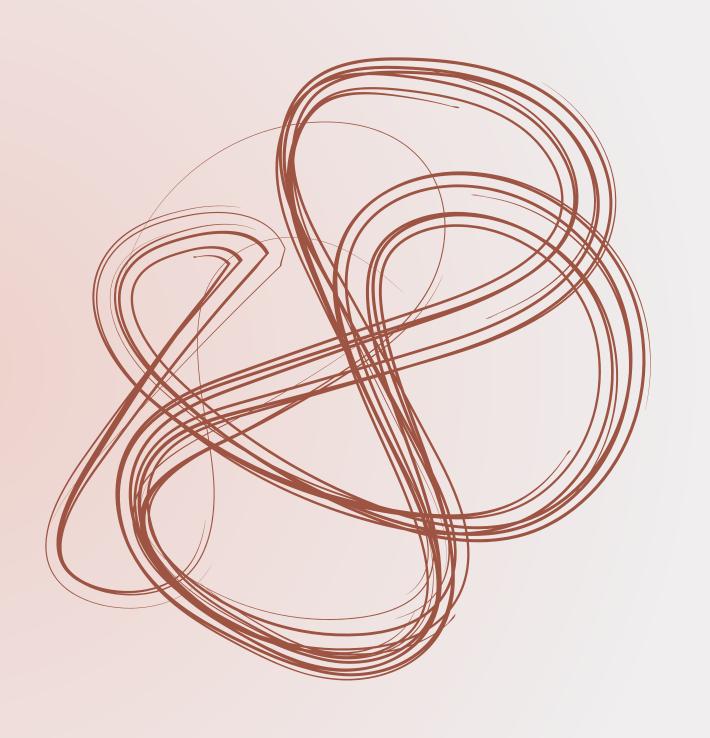

# A question to begin with...

Emotions + digital tools : possible

OR...

do they go into "airplane mode"? 🛪

(CEFR-CV mediation includes socio-affective dimensions)

## 2. Theoretical Framework

#### What do we mean by mediation today? (CEFR-CV)

- Creating bridges between people, texts, languages, contexts;
- Cognitive + Social + Socio-affective dimensions;
- From transmitting knowledge → to co-constructing meaning.



#### Why does emotional mediation matter?

- Emotions shape attention, memory, motivation, engagement;
- Supports inclusion, learner voice, and a sense of safety;
- Human connection is a condition for learning, not a "nice extra".

## 2. Theoretical Framework

#### Why talk about digital mediation?

- New semiotic spaces: multimodal, collaborative, intercultural;
- Students need guidance to navigate digital meaning-making;
- Without it, risk of human disconnection behind the screen.

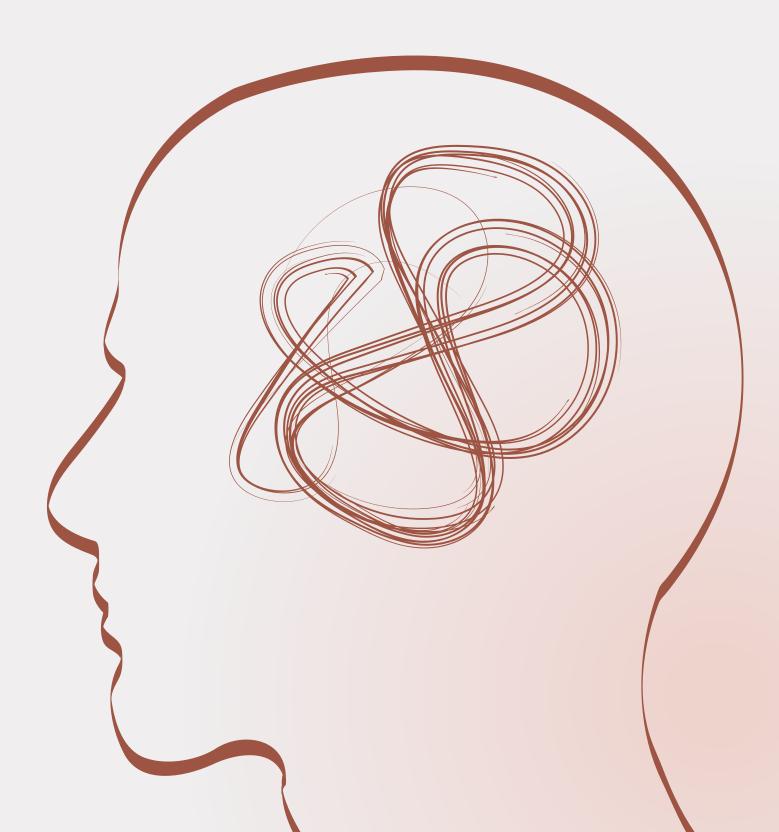


#### Teacher as a "Double Mediator"

- a. Between learners and language + emotions;
- b. Between learners and digital environments;
- **ab.** Integrating **both** → more inclusive, relational, meaningful learning.

# 3. Methodological Approach

- Qualitative & reflective approach
- Based on authentic teacher training practices
- Data sources:
  - Co-design of activities
  - Observations and self-reflection
  - Teacher feedback
- Focus on professional growth & meaning-making
- Inspired by:
  - Reflective Practice (Schön; Farrell)
  - Action-Research in language education



# 3. Methodological Approach

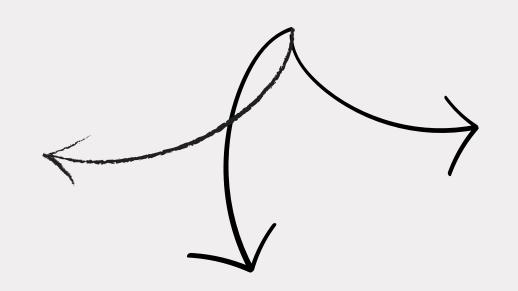
#### Why these contexts matter

- Promote mediation, collaboration and conscious digital use;
- Connect emotions, identity and technology;
- Encourage teachers to grow as double mediators.

## 4. Case 1 - Digital Storytelling & Emotional Engagement

#### Setting

- Futura Mondadori digital teacher training (secondary school);
- Teachers co-designing a digital learning unit (UdA).



#### **Mediation Moves**

- Emotional → expressing and reflecting on feelings evoked by songs;
- ► Linguistic → reformulating and using emotional vocabulary;
- <u>■ Digital</u> → intentional use of multimodal tools.

#### The Task

- Activity: Voices and Emotions in Italian Music;
- <u>Tools</u>: YouTube, LyricsTraining, Padlet, Kahoot;
  - Students analyse songs and emotional vocabulary;
- <u>Final product</u>: collaborative commented playlist.



#### What emerged

- Increased student engagement and participation;
- Greater authentic self-expression;
- Inclusion of diverse cognitive styles and backgrounds.



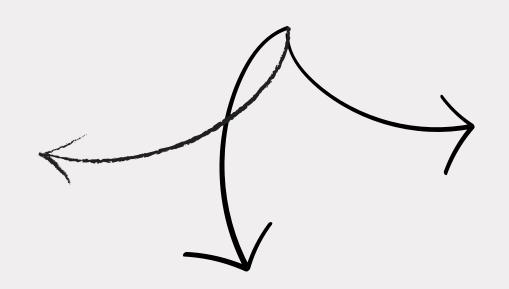


Digital tools can amplify students' emotional voice — when framed reflectively.

## 4. Case 2 - "Cultural Bridges": Intercultural & Digital Mediation

#### Setting

- Futura Mondadori digital teacher training (secondary school and adult learners);
- Intercultural exchange supported by digital tools.



#### **Mediation Moves**

- **Linguistic** → paraphrasing, simplifying, reformulating (CEFR-CV);
- <u>Digital</u> → co-constructing meaning in an online environment.

#### The Task

- <u>Activity</u>: creation of a collaborative Padlet: *Cultural Bridges*;
  - <u>Tools</u>: Slido, Kahoot, Padlet, Genially;
- Students post texts, images or short videos about their own cultures;
  - <u>Final product</u>: a shared intercultural Padlet wall with posts + peer comments (questions and reflections)



### What emerged

- Increased empathy and curiosity towards other cultures;
- Greater intercultural awareness and respect for differences;
- Strengthened collective voice of the group.





Digital tools can create safe spaces to mediate cultures, not only to share content.

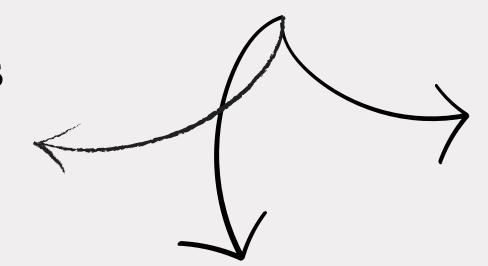
### 4. Case 3 - PostMasterITALS: Professional & Reflective Mediation

#### Setting

ClubAlumni PostMasterITALS

professional community (Ca' Foscari);

 Ongoing professional development
 for Italian L2/LS teachers.



#### **Mediation Moves**

- Professional → peer mentoring and co-construction of knowledge;
- - <u>Digital</u> → online community of practice & multimodal exchange.

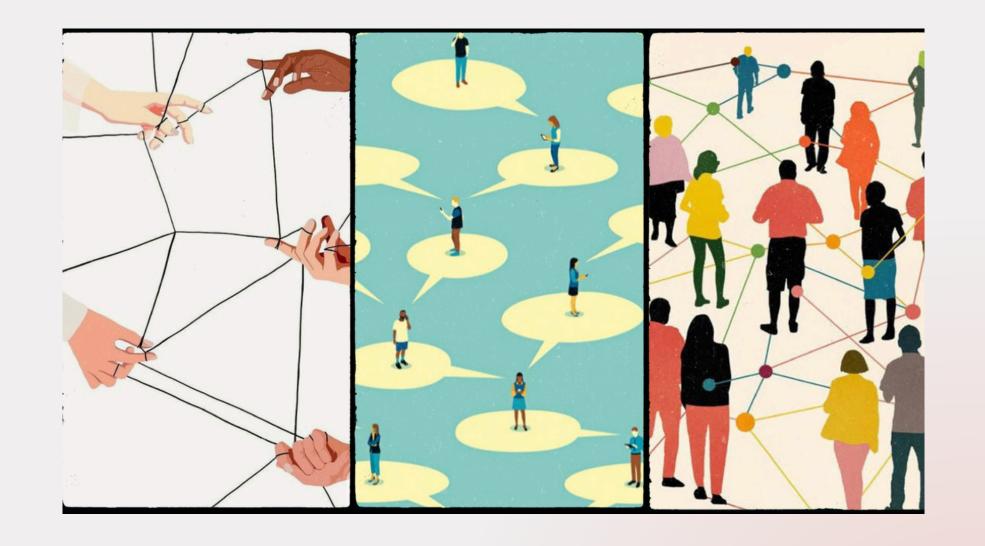
#### The Task

- Activity: ongoing teacher reflection and co-mediation through the
  - PostMaster ITALS community;
  - <u>Tools</u>: moodle, online meetings, website, newsletter, social media;
    - Focus on collegial reflection and professional growth;
- <u>Final product</u>: shared professional reflections, collaborative resources, and co-designed teaching ideas.



#### What emerged

- Stronger teacher professional identity;
- Safe space for shared vulnerability and authentic dialogue;
- Greater integration of
   reflection + emotions + digital practice.





Mediation is not only for students:

teachers also grow through emotional and digital mediation.

# 5. Key Insights & Implications - Pedagogical Implication

#### Implications for Language Education

- Mediation offers a transformative framework to integrate language, emotions and digital tools;
- Emotions are not a "nice extra": they are a driver of motivation and inclusion;
- Digital tools should be designed as relational and symbolic spaces, not only technical ones;
- Multimodal & reflective tasks foster authentic self-expression and engagement;
- Mediation creates bridges of meaning between identities, languages and technologies.

If mediation is an ethical stance, how should this influence the way we train teachers in digital pedagogy?

# 5. Key Insights & Implications - Implication for Teacher Education

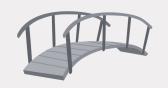
#### Implications for Teacher Education & Professional Development

- The <u>double mediator</u> role requires integrated competences;
- Teacher growth happens through reflection + emotions + digital practice;
- Communities of practice support dialogue, shared vulnerability and peer learning;
- Mediation is also an ethical stance: it keeps the human dimension at the centre of education.

If mediation is also an ethical stance, what small step of ongoing professional learning can we take to make it an integral part of our digital practice?



# Conclusion



Emotions and digital tools are not incompatible: mediation can bridge them.



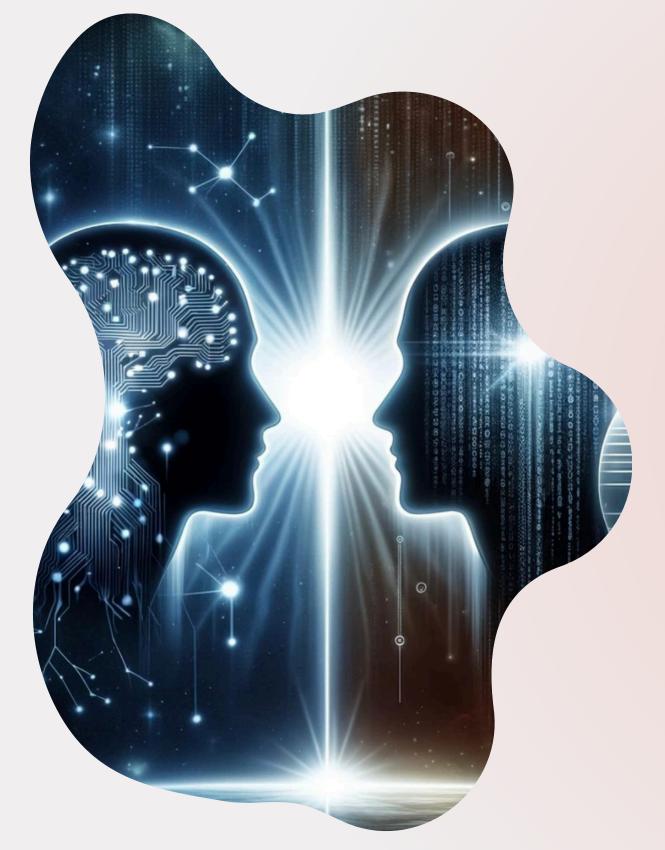
Integrating emotions and digital practice requires developing integrated competences over time, through small steps of ongoing professional learning.
